Dare Commissioners Approve \$1,-710 Expenditure to Dig Canals;
One Job Rescinded

The Dare County Board of Commissioners have approved the awarding of contracts totaling \$1,710 for two harbor improvement projects, one at Wanchese and one at Buxton. The bids on the projects were opened and the contracts approved at a meeting Tuesday which was attended by all the commissioners, Chairman C. C. Duvall, E. P. White, H. F. Perry, Newcomb Midgett, and Lawrence

The board also decided to meet as a Board of Equalization and Review on April 28 and directed that notices regarding the Board of Equalization and Review be published April 11, 18, and 25 in the

local newspaper.
Two appointments made by the ioners were Arnold Daniels of Wanchese as county oyster bottom inspector and Fred Trew of Manteo as county Civil Defense director. Mr. Daniels succeeds Floyd Hooper of Stumpy Point, who resigned, and Mr. Trew, former assistant Civil Defense director, succeeds Robert K. Gunn, who

The board instructed that he not commence any digging until notified that the county has received a deed for the land through which the canal runs. N. F. Jennette promised the board at the March meeting that he would deed to the county the land necessary for a harbor about 250 yards long.
