Mr. Jones, well known through the coastland during his years of boating, entered the Coast Guard Service about 50 years ago, and retired in 1939, ending over 30 years of honorable service. Then he and Mrs. Jones built a new home three miles north of Manteo. He served most of his enlistments in Nags Head station. He is one of the ten children of the late Asa Warren Jones, and Martha Creef Jones. His father was Register of Deeds, Superintendent of schools, and otherwise active in the public life of Dare County some 60 years and more ago. He was born at East Lake, but has lived in Manteo most of his life.
