RESENTMENT GROWS HIGHWAY CHAIRMAN TO AGAINST BEACHES SANITARY DISTRICT

Citizens' Wrath Rises Against High Taxes Imposed, and Buying Equipment

Wrath is rising high against the action of the Commissioners of the Dare Beaches Sanitary District for several reasons and from several quarters. To begin with, in the face of a petition by which 58 per cent of the resident freeholders of the district are seeking its dissolution, the three men who run the district have persisted in entering into an agreement to buy two fire trucks, on the pretext that insurance rates will be reduced.

In the second place, the district is now split widely open, with the town of Kill Devil Hills comprising nearly half the property Commissoners seek to impose on the Mags Head area and the Kitty pay for the fire trucks.
