A meat cutting demonstration in Elizabeth City on October 27, 1960 will be conducted by the N. C. Extension Service, N. C. Department of Agriculture and the N. C. Cattlemen's Association. The meeting will be attended by representatives of the various groups who keep the consumers in the state posted on food facts and trends.

An educational meat program will be presented by the sponsors in which they will bring the group the latest information on meat selection and care, showing how modern meat cutting methods provide the consuming public with a wide variety of meat cuts to assure maximum utilization of plentiful supplies of the meat that grows under the hide of cattle, hogs and sheep. A variety of wholesale and retail cuts of beef, pork and lamb will be used in the demonstration.
