### RAY RESPESS IS NAMED ON ALL-STATE TEAM

Ray Respass, Pantego's outstanding basketball star, was recently named to the Greensboro Daily News All-State Team as announced on Wednesday.

Respass was cited in the article as "the state's No. 1 college prospect, a regular for four years on the Pantego High Team, averaging 18, 21, 23 and 24 points in succeeding years, and averaged up to 70 per cent of his shots from the floor".

His coach, Jim Kinion, said Thursday that he is proud that his star cager has been selected for this honor. Kinion says of Respass, "he shoots from all over, moves well, is a good defensive player, an improved ball handler, and a tremendous rebounder. He has all the natural abilities and the greatest desire in the world. When the competition is tops, Ray is the best."

Respass, who paced Pantego into two state tournaments, is headed for the University of North Carolina on a grant-in aid. He had the highest scoring average of any of the all-state selections.

Larry Worsely of Oak City and Billy Brogden of Wilmington were the only other Easterners named on the team. George McLean of Knapp, Pud Hassell of Beaufort, and Tommy Matlocks of Kingston were Easterners making the honorable mention list.

Pantego will hold its annual athletic banquet at Respass Bros. Barbecue in Greenville on Wednesday, March 29, at 7:30 o'clock, at which time Coach Frank McGuire of U. N. C. will be the main speaker.
