HATTERAS BETA CLUB PROVIDES ID TAGS

The Beta Club of Cape Hatteras School is making available identification tags in co-operation with the Civil Defense program. The wearing of ID tags is recommended to assist in positive and rapid identification in case of accidents, sudden illness, a lost child, or national emergency. The tags are of stainless steel and the lettering is permanently indented. Anyone in the area who is interested in getting one of these tags is asked to fill out a form in this manner with not over 18 letters and spaces on one line: Line 1, name, line 2, street address, route, or box number; line 3, city and state; line 4, telephone number and religion; line 5, medical data—allergies or diseases—or next of kin. The ID tags are of two types—the necklace type and the wrist type—and are of maximum size in order to fit every one. Completed forms along 55¢ for each wrist type tag and 50¢ for each necklace type tag should be mailed to the Beta Club, Cape Hatteras School, Buxton, N. C. The tags should be received in three to four weeks and will be delivered by the Beta Club members.

Mr. Tugwell is attending East Carolina, where he is a member of Lambda Chi Alpha Fraternity.

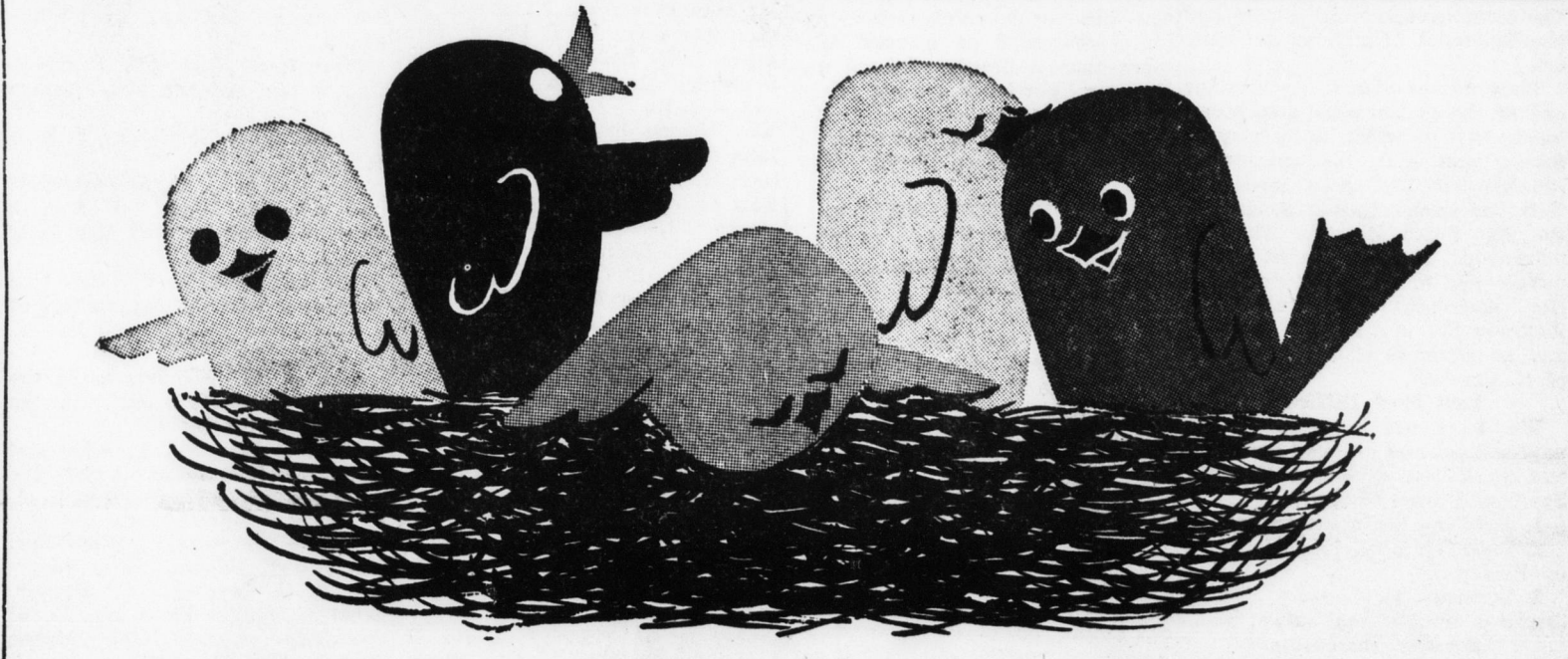
