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A LARGE ADDITION BEING PLANNED FOR THE PUNGO HOSPITAL

After Twelve Years Service to Belhaven Area Folks, More Room Is A Necessity

After twelve years of service to the people of this coastal communi-ty, Pungo District Hospital in Belhaven is planning to enlarge in order that they may meet the everincreasing need for more room. On July 4, 1949 when the hospital opened it seemed adequate, and few could see the extent it would be used. It was the first hospital built in North Carolina under the Hill-Burton program, and was financed by state and federal funds as well as local donations. It is operated as a non-profit institution.

Work on the immediate changes will begin as soon as all of the funds are available, according to Lonnie Moore, business manager. Raymond Foson of New Bern is the architect. The expansion plan includes the adding of approximately 5,500 square feet of new construction and some of the existing de-partments will be remodeled. There will be a new emergency room, a storeroom for hospital equipment, a conference and doctors room labor room, delivery room, a sterilizing and supply room and operat-ing room. The business office will be enlarged as will the laboratory and X-ray department, and a formula and nursery work room will be added. The extra room will allow four new beds added to the twentyfour they now have, dreams of the future include 25 additional beds.
