Our favorite dessert is perextra special dessert for Sun-day dinner. The following recipe keeps well in the refrigerator for several days so can be prepared on Friday evening in less than 30 minutes for a glamorous, no-work Sunday dessert. The tartness of the orange goes well with the creamy and crunchy dessert.

ORANGE MOUSSE CAKE to 8 plain lady fingers

pkgs. (3 oz. each) cream cheese ½ cup frozen orange juice

concentrate cup finely chopped pecans, almonds or walnuts

½ cup confectioners sugar pkg. (2 oz.) dessert topping mix

Line 1-quart loaf pan or mold with straight sides with foil, having ends extend above pan. Split lady fingers; stand around side of pan, cut side in. If necessary, trim lady fingers to top of pan. Beat softened cream cheese until fluffy. Then gradually add thawed, undiluted orange juice while beating. Stir in nuts and sugar. Prepare topping mix according to package directions. Fold into cheese mixture. This will become quite stiff. Spoon into prepared pan. Chill overnight. To unmold, lift out of pan with foil. Cut into slices. Makes 5 to 6 servings. Store left over portion in re-frigerator. This stores well for several days.
