and Brother Jesse of Arlington, Va. Fatally Injured

An Ocracoke resident and his brother from Virginia, who were severely injured in an automoblie accident near Salvo last Saturday, died this week in Norfolk General Hospital, becoming Dare's fifth and sixth traffic fatalities for 1962.

Rudolph K Waller, 56, received a broken back when the car in which he was riding overturned after leaving the highway. Waller had been rushed to Norfolk General with his brother, Jesse Waller, 54, of Arlington, Va. Both were unconscious. Jesse Waller is reported to have received serious head injuries in the accident and he died Wednesday morning.

The accident occurred Saturday at 10 a.m. on N. C. 1001 six miles north of Avon when the car hit some water on the road while traveling at high speed, went out of control and overturned, according to Highway Patrolman H. W. Pridgen.




