NIGHT BOATING ACCIDENT

MRS. JOSEPHINE BROADWELL DROWNS WHEN CRAFT COLLIDES WITH BUOY

Shortly before midnight Saturday a 29 year old mother of two children drowned near the Belhaven breakwater after the small boat in which she was riding swerved when it collided with the No. 3 buoy, throwing the woman into the water.

The mishap took the life of Mrs. Josephine Cox Broadwell of Washington, and occurred as the group was headed back to the Rhodes cottage at Sandy Shores about 11:30 p.m. The boat carrying Mrs. Broadwell and her husband and Mr. and Mrs. Charles Rhodes of Washington had just left the River Forest Manor pier when they collided with the marker. Rhodes dived in and managed to save his wife, but Mrs. Broadwell disappeared in the choppy waters. Her body was recovered by the Belhaven Coast Guard Unit and the Washington Rescue Squad about 2:30 a.m.

Mrs. Broadwell was born in Robeson County, graduated from Orrum High School and Carolina College, was a member of the First Baptist Church and the Women of the Moose Lodge.

She is survived by her husband, Joseph M. Broadwell; two daughters, Wanda and Susie of the home in Washington; her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Cox, two brothers, Frank Jr. and Dennis Cox of Proctorville; three sisters, Mrs. Bettie Edens of Hamilton, Mrs. Nma McLellan of Proctorville and Mrs. Edna Britt of Lumberton.

Funeral services were held at the Proctorville Baptist Church Monday afternoon at 5:00 p.m. by the Rev. Nash Odum and the Rev. Luther Matthews. Burial was in the Broad Ridge cemetery.
