With the current trend towards spending, and there is little in sight to hamper that policy, the Dare County Board of Commissioners will wind up the year with some new records set for spending and exceeding its budget.

The county's fiscal year begins July 1st and ends June 30th following. At mid-year, the last of December, the board had already expended almost its total budget for fiscal 1966-67. That figure was pegged at \$10.320 in the budget for the entire year and through December \$9,293 38 had been paid from the county general fund for operation of the board. By end of the third quarter, expenses had climbed to \$12,724.-53, and reliable estimates place operational costs of that office by the year's end at \$17,000 or
