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## INCREASES SOUGHT FROM BOARD FOR WELFARE, SCHOOLS

Dare Commissioners Hear Other Matters in Two-Day Meeting

Meeting Monday and Tuesday, the Dare County commissioners heard budget requests, other pleadings for monetary support and attended to routine business matters.

The budget for operation of Dare County school system for 1967-68, in amount of \$201,763.61, plus about \$12,000 for capital outlay was presented for consideration of the board. This is up from last year's budget of \$174,372. Of that amount, about \$98,000 would be required from ad valorem taxes, the balance coming from state and federal funds.

Also on the increase was the welfare budget, up some 13% over last year. Request for \$53,006.55 from the Dare board was up from \$46,969.47 for last year. With state and federal funds, the total budget for welfare during the year ending June 30 was \$224,072.03. When percentages are established for the coming year, the total might reach a quarter-million dollars. More will be published in later issues, giving more detailed accounting of the various funds.

Another request for funds came from Dr. Isa Grant, director of the Pasquotank-Camden health department, who was appealing for 5% of the Dare County A.B.C. system's profits to help in operating an alcoholic rehabilitation center to be established in Elizabeth City. No contribution was authorized, but the commissioners did on Tuesday request legislation to INCREASES, Page Eight

## THE LOST COLONY BEGINS NIGHTLY SHOWING JUNE 23

Curtain Time This Year Is 8:45 Due to Daylight Saving Time

Thirty years ago on July 4, 1937, the first performance of "The Lost Colony" was presented in Waterside Theatre at Fort Raleigh National Historic Site. Except for a four-year "black-out" during World War II, the play has been presented every summer, making it the "grand-daddy" of outdoor symphonic dramas bringing history alive.

Thus, when "The Lost Colony" opens for 1967 on June 23, it will mark the 27th production season. Performances will continue at 8:45 p.m. (Eastern Daylight Saving Time) through August 27, Monday through Saturday of each week, with closing night the only Sunday performance of the season.

"The Lost Colony" was written by Pulitzer Prize-winner Paul Green and is directed and choreographed by Joe Layton of Broadway, TV and Hollywood fame. Layton won an EMMY award for staging the Barbra Streisand TV spectacular and a TONY award for directing and choreographing Richard Rodgers' "No Strings" on Broadway. He recently choreographed a motion picture, "Thoroughly Modern Millie", starring Julie Andrews, Carol Channing and Mary Tyler Moore.

A company of 135 performers and technicians stages "The Lost Colony" to tell the story of Sir Walter Raleigh's first English settlements in America in the 1580's and 20 years before Jamestown and 30 years before Plymouth Rock. Also depicted is the birth of Virginia Dare, first child of English parents born in what is now the United States.

Fox said that Dare County residents may purchase the season tickets in person, or via mail by enclosing \$5 in check, cash or money order.

## OREGON INLET DEEPENING TO TWENTY-ONE FEET NOW GETTING HEAVY BACKING

Project Expected to Cost Approximately \$10-Million and Likely To Be Funded by Congress Next Year; Improvements May Be Completed Within Three Years

NAGS HEAD BOY IS WOFFORD GRADUATE

Donald S. Russell, United States District Judge, delivered the commencement address. Russell served one year in the U. S. Senate and two years as Governor of South Carolina prior to his present judgeship. A total of one hundred and seventy-one seniors received degrees from the 113 year old, all-male institution in Spartanburg, South Carolina.

Following the efforts of his father, Alvah Ward, Jr., who devoted much time over recent years to preparation of briefs and supporting arguments presented before the Corps' Washington office as well as Washington interests. Completion of the improvements, expected to cost about \$10 million, might not be completed for three years, according to information from the Corps of Engineers.

The improvements in the works at present are not to be confused with recent efforts to get Oregon Inlet approved as the deep-water port of entry in connection with the phosphate interests in Beaufort County.

There are five inlets, including Ocrakee and Hatteras under consideration by the Corps and other agencies in that connection. The other two are Swash and Drum.

The Dare County commissioners about two months ago went on record as endorsing Oregon Inlet for the deep-water port.
