## 550 VOTE AT BELHAVEN

**BELHAVEN** — There was little slack time at the voting booths here Saturday as 550 persons cast ballots for 54 candidates.

Rep. Walter B. Jones, D-N.C., led the Democratic ticket with 375 votes. Sen. Sam J. Ervin, Jr., got 326 votes in his bid for renomination.

In the gubernatorial race, Mel Broughton received 206 votes, Lt. Gov. Robert Scott 189, and Reginald Hawkins 116. M. D. (Red) Whisman led county candidates with 329 votes.

## DOLPHIN REPORTED FROM OFF HATTERAS

More dolphin were caught off Hatteras during the past week but the main catches continued to be blackfin tuna. A few king mackerel, amberjack and false albacore were also brought in by Gulf Stream fishermen, but so far no reports of billfishes.

Blue marlin have been taken as early as late April, but these giant fish, also white marlin and sailfish usually do not show in numbers until late May.

In February 12, 1922, "Miss Murray" married Richard Lee Mann, a farmer and stock raiser of Fairfield. They had two wonderful children.

Mrs. Mann is a lover of music, having taught private music lessons for 15 years in her home. Twenty students have gone beyond the level "end in music. She quotes "It is hard to express the joy and pleasure I receive from teaching private music lessons. The appreciation and gratitude these students showed was delightful to watch and listen as they grew in knowledge and learned to appreciate the art of good music. She has been organist for the Fairfield Methodist Sunday School and church for 20 years.

Here's a flavorful and inexpensive way to enjoy the delicate flavor of lamb. PERSIAN PILAFF, a savory steamed rice steeped in the flavors of lamb, onion and fresh tomatoes, will bring the plates back for second helpings.

3 tbs. oil  
2 lbs. lamb shoulder (cut in 1" cubes)  
1 cup chopped onion  
1 cup peeled fresh tomatoes, chopped  
1 1/2 cups uncooked quick-cooking rice  
2 1/2 cups hot water  
1 chicken bouillon cube  
2 tbs. butter  
Salt, pepper, garlic salt to taste

Preheat oven to 350° F. Braise meat cubes in hot oil. Drain excess fat. Add onion and lightly brown with meat. Add tomatoes; cover and simmer for 15 minutes. Put meat mixture in oiled 2-qt. casserole. Put uncooked rice in center on top of meat. Put butter in center of rice. Dissolve bouillon cube in hot water. Pour around edge of casserole. Bake for 1 hour. Serves 4 to 6.

You can make this thrifty dish for less than \$3, and the cost of electricity is about 5¢. Quite a bargain, electricity.
