TOWN BOARD SET UP ORDINANCE FOR COUNCIL

BELHAVEN — The board of Aldermen agreed at its regular meeting Monday to set up an ordinance to establish a Good Neighbors Council.

The local human relations organizations asked for the ordinance after R. S. Harrell of the North Carolina Good Neighbors Council of Raleigh discussed the importance of such a group.

Other board activities: Fire Chief Leon Smith reported five local alarms and five rural alarms and the loss of one tobacco barn during July. Nine rescue calls were answered.

Norwood Tetterton, Jr., reported that permits issued in July, included seven electrical, three plumbing, five building, and three location.

Julian Goff announced the resignation of Leonard Tinker from the planning board. Goff said his term was expiring and suggested the board think of a replacement. A motion to re-appoint Goff was approved. Selection of a successor for Tinker was taken under advisement.

Earl Daniels, city manager, asked that a policy be established whereby users could make payments monthly on water and sewer taps. The board agreed and the following scale was adopted: For water the fee is \$80 or \$20 down and \$5 monthly, and sewerage \$70 or \$10 down and \$5 monthly. For a combination connection the down payment will be \$30 down and \$10 monthly.

The mayor reported that grading for the north side park site had been completed and that construction of some picnic equipment and pouring of concrete for tennis courts would begin this week.

The board also approved a proposal to pay hospital insurance premiums for full time town employees.

A petition asked establishment of a public housing project for Belhaven. The board took it under advisement.

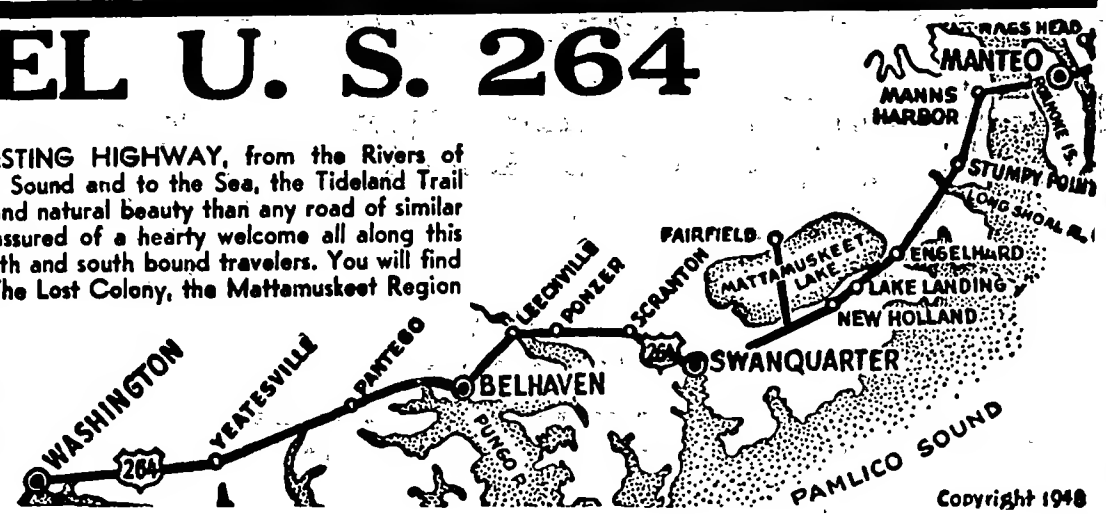

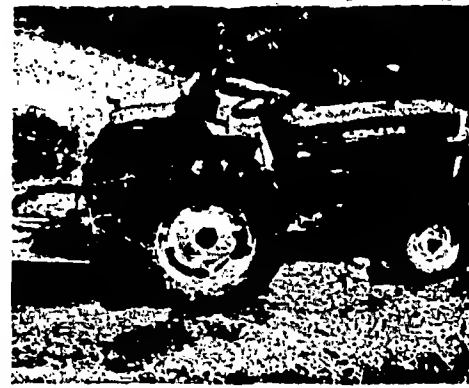

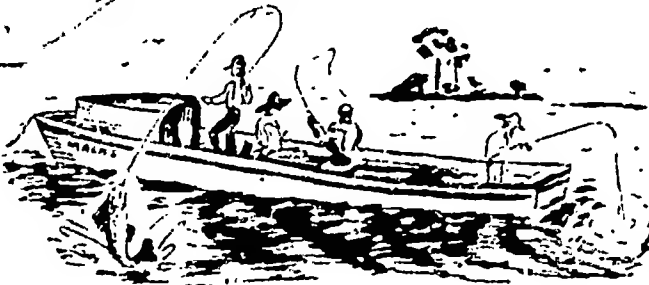
