

**WOODSTOCK EMC
REFUNDS CAPITAL
CREDITS, \$32,000**

Woodstock Electric Membership Corporation this week mailed capital credit refund checks to members served in 1957. The total refunds for 1957 amount to over \$32,000. Individual refund checks vary in size from very small up to almost \$500, with the average check amounting to over \$12.

As a member-owned rural electric cooperative, Woodstock operates on a non-profit basis. The amount which would be a profit in other types of business is a margin in an electric membership corporation. This margin is refunded to the cooperative's member-owners in the form of capital credit refunds. The delay in refunding capital credits is necessary because Woodstock must maintain a reserve fund in case of emergencies.

Woodstock Electric Membership Corporation is locally owned and controlled by the people who receive electric service from the cooperative. The continuing objective of the cooperative is dependable electric service at the lowest cost consistent with a sound financial operation.

The president of Woodstock Electric is D. R. Paul of Wenaona and the manager is William W. Bulluck.

**SALVATION ARMY SETUP
DESCRIBED FOR LIONS**

BELHAVEN — The work of the Salvation Army was described for the Belhaven Lions Club Thursday by Capt. Clyde Beasley of the Washington unit of the famed organization.

The Salvation Army was founded in 1865 in London by William Booth. It is a religious and charity group and dispenses the gospel without regard for race, color, or creed. The Salvation Army is a military type of organization in that it relies heavily on efficiency and discipline.

The Salvation Army operates disaster units and makes itself known during natural disasters. Beasley noted that Belhaven has known the services of the Salvation Army especially during hurricanes. The army has distributed food, clothing, and other necessities of life.

Beasley said the Salvation Army also operates homes for unwed mothers, child care centers, summer camps, and servicemen's homes. In Beaufort county, the Salvation Army has a camp near Washington.

**MATTAMUSKEET HUNT
APPLICATIONS DUE SOON**

RALEIGH — The N. C. Wildlife Resources Commission has announced this year's deadline for pre-drawing applications to hunt waterfowl at Lake Mattamuskeet National Wildlife Refuge. According to a Commission spokesman, all Tarheel sportsmen who plan to hunt waterfowl at the Mattamuskeet refuge this year should submit their applications for reservations before 6 p.m. on Sept. 17 to the waterfowl blind reservation committee. Lake Mattamuskeet, New Holland.

Forms on which to submit applications are available either from the Refuge at New Holland or Wildlife Resources Commission, Box 2919, Raleigh. A list of procedures governing Lake Mattamuskeet waterfowl blind and guide applications indicates that all applications received before the deadline will be eligible for entry in a public drawing at the Hyde County courthouse in Swan Quarter on Sept. 19. The drawing will begin at 9 a.m. and blind reservations for preferred dates will be made on the basis of drawing results.

Following the drawing, applications will be processed on a first-come, first-served basis. The commission, this week, urged North Carolina sportsmen to obtain applications as soon as possible in order to be sure they have the correct forms, have them filled out correctly, and understand the procedures which must be followed to compete for a blind at Mattamuskeet.
