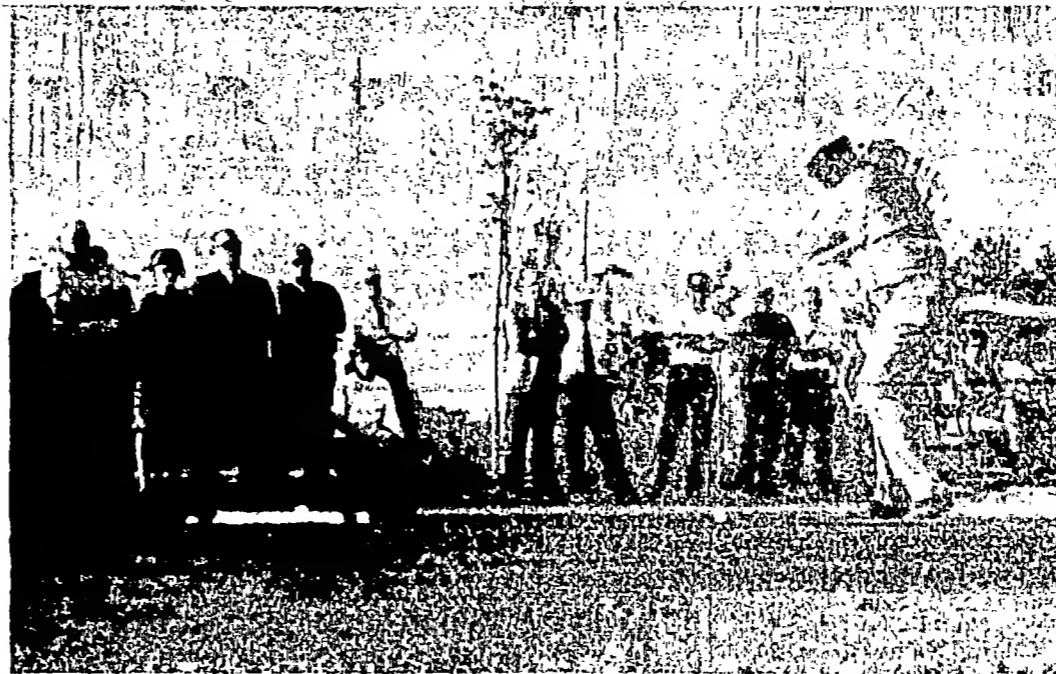

BELHAVEN BOARD MEETS IN ROUTINE SESSION

BELHAVEN. — Routine business filled the agenda of the monthly meeting of the board of aldermen.

Police Chief Sam Boger reported nine arrests including one juvenile taken into custody during October. He said the police car was driven 2,187 miles and consumed 244 gallons of gasoline. Seven doors in the business community were found unlocked during a routine check.

Boger said seven dogs were destroyed during the month. Norwood Tetterton, building inspector, reported five building permits were issued during October.

Fire Chief Leon White, who retired Oct. 31, made his last report to the board. He said that during October there were two local alarms. There were no rural alarms. The fire department answered 11 rescue calls.

The board approved Russell Johnston as the new fire chief, succeeding Smith.

The mayor presented Smith with a plaque in appreciation for the retiring chief's 35 years of service to the volunteer fire department.

The board approved purchase of a police band radio and Christmas lighting fixtures.

Dr. Charles O. Boyette said plans for the Christmas parade are in the planning stage.
