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AIRFIELD GOES OVER TOP IN WAR FUND DRIVE BY WIDE MARGIN OF \$107

Small Community Sweeps Over Goal With Donations From Almost Every Home; Ocracoke Was First To Reach Quota; Final Reports Not In From Other Districts.

Fairfield has topped its Red Cross War Fund goal of \$325 by more than \$100 raising a total of \$425. It was announced Monday night by N. W. Shelton, county chairman. It was the first district in Hyde County to make a final report. The drive was headed by Mrs. R. F. Baynes.

The list of names which will appear in these columns either this week or next shows that almost every home in the Fairfield area donated during the drive. Many of the donations were five dollars and more.

The arrival of the report in county headquarters Monday made Fairfield the second community in Hyde County to go over its quota. Ocracoke was the first, but its final report was not available at our deadline for copy Monday night.

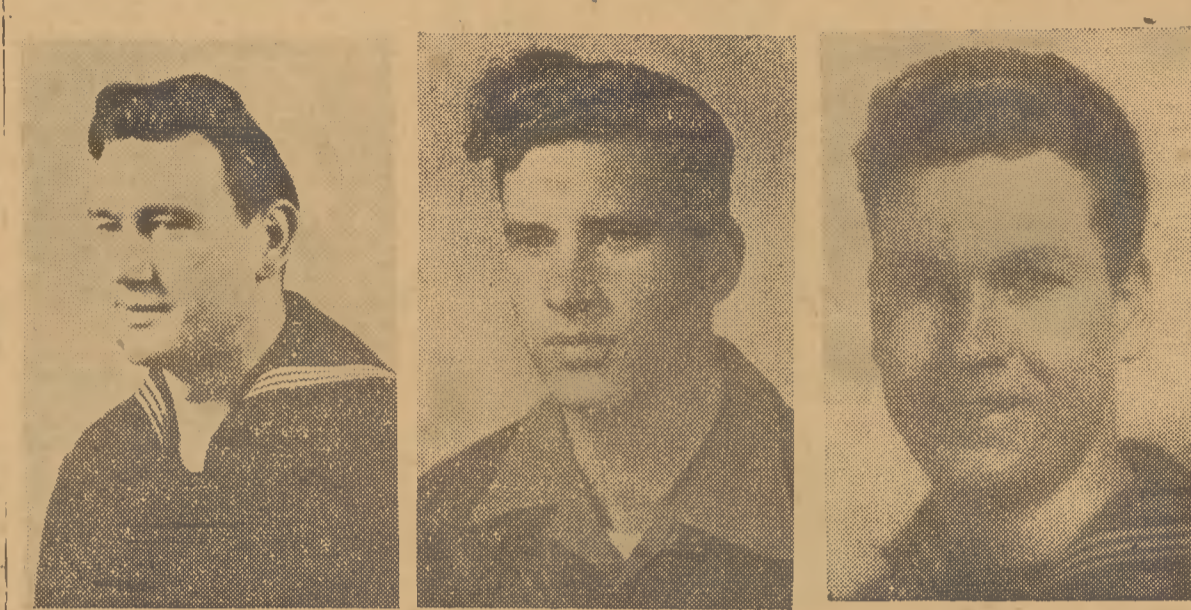

LEECHVILLE BROTHERS SERVING COUNTRY IN WAR



THE THREE RADCLIFF BROTHERS, Delphine, George T., and Gurnwood, sons of Mrs. Mary Radcliff and the late George Radcliff of Leechville, are serving their country in the armed forces. The Radcliffs are one of a number of Hyde County families who have at least three members serving in the war.

Delphine, 29, the oldest of the brothers, is a member of the Marines. He enlisted in November 1942. His rating is seaman, first class. He is somewhere in the Marshall Islands in the Pacific theatre. He graduated from the Sladesville high school and attended the Norfolk Business College.

George T., 27, is in the Navy. He enlisted in September 1936. He holds the rating of E. M. 1st class, and serves on an aircraft carrier in the Pacific. He was at Pearl Harbor when it was bombed.

Gurnwood, 23, youngest of the Radcliff brothers, is also in the Navy. He enlisted in August 1942, and took his training at the Great Lakes training station in Illinois. He is a fireman, first class. At present he is serving in England. He has served in India and other far-distant places. He was in the invasion of Sicily and that of Italy.

Gurnwood was a welder in the shipyard at Newport News, Va., before joining the service. He graduated from the Belhaven high school in 1940.

HIGHEST VALUED HOMES AT ENGELHARD

Berry Asks That Valuation Be Equalized With Swan Quarter

Engelhard homes have a higher tax valuation than those at Swan Quarter and Engelharders think adjustments should be made, Ed Berry, commissioner from Lake Landing township, told the commissioners Thursday, as they sat as a board of equalization and review. He asked that the valuations be equalized and his suggestion set off discussion on the topic. No action was taken.

A. L. Cuthrell of Fairfield and J. S. Mason of Swan Quarter, the other members of the board, took the view that making such an adjustment was beyond the powers of the board of equalization and review. It was stated that valuation adjustments were arrived at by comparing neighboring valuations rather than those of other localities.

Mr. Berry stated that it appeared to him that the valuations of the homes in the two towns should be about the same. Tax records show homes in the best residential section of Engelhard valued higher than the nicer homes in the county seat.

Mr. Cuthrell and Mr. Mason said that they thought a change could not be made without a new valuation and one on a county-wide basis. The present valuations had been set as fair by appraisers representing all sections, they stated. The proposal got no further than the discussion stage. No definite action was taken.

OCRACOKE OVER TOP IN RED CROSS WAR FUND DRIVE

Final Reports Not Available From Other Hyde Districts

Ocracoke Red Cross War Fund officials have reported \$281 collected during the current drive, which is \$31 more than their quota of \$250 set for that township. Mrs. Tom Howard, assisted by the Rev. W. R. Dixon, headed the drive.

Reports made to the county War Fund chairman through Monday morning showed that Hyde County had raised less than half the quota of \$2,200. It was said, however, that figures on hand were incomplete and did not show a true picture of the progress of the drive.

Many neighborhoods have not made reports. Recent rains and the muddy roads have hindered the work of solicitors. Because of this, the drive will likely be extended. The national drive will end the last of this month.

Persons who have contributed toward the Red Cross fund but feel that they would like to give more, may do so it was said. Recognition will be given by publications of names in the county paper.

ABOUT MAILING PAPERS OVERSEAS

Information Given Out By Swan Quarter Office to Clear Confusion

Newspapers cannot be sent to soldiers overseas by second class mail, except under certain conditions. They can be sent to members of the Navy. This information was released last week by the Swan Quarter post office to help clear away the confusion that exists among patrons.

It was stated that many people attempted to send the home newspaper to their relatives and friends in the army. The only way this can be done is by first class mail, like any letter. This goes at 3c an ounce or fraction thereof. It cannot weigh more than 8 ounces. Airmail rates are 6c for 1-2 ounce or fraction thereof.

Postal regulations do not permit publishers of newspapers to mail new subscriptions to men in the Army overseas. Men who take the paper before going overseas can have their address changed and in these cases the publishers have to wrap the paper in a special wrapper. New subscriptions can be taken if the person subscribing gets permission of his commanding officer.

The Hyde County paper goes to many men overseas, but in each case they were subscribing before being moved and paper goes in special marked wrappers. Some patrons send the paper to them by air mail which costs about 12c per copy. They do this to get the home news to them as quickly as possible.

RATION REMINDER

Gasoline—In 17 East Coast states A-9 coupons are good through May 8.

Tire Inspection—For A coupon holders, deadline is March 31; for C-coupon holders May 31; and for B-coupon holders, June 30.

Shoes — Stamp No. 18 in Book One is good for one pair. Stamp No. 1 on the airplane sheet in Book Three is good for one pair.

Fuel Oil—Period 4 and 5 coupons are good through September 30.

Red 10-pt. stamps A8, B8 and C8, D8, E8 and F8 in Book 4 are good through May 20. Waste kitchen fats are redeemed at two ration points plus four cents a pound.

G8, H8, J8, expire June 18 and K8, L8, M8, (Book Four) become valid April 9 and expire June 18.

Processed Foods—10-pt. stamps A8, B8, C8, D8, and E8 in Book Four are good through May 20.

F8, G8, H8, J8, and K8 (Book Four) become valid April 1st and expire June 21.

Sugar stamp 30 (Book Four) good for five pounds for indefinite period. Stamp 31 will also become valid on April 1, for five pounds of sugar for indefinite period.

Sugar stamp 40 (Book Four) good for five pounds canning sugar until February 28, 1945 (13 mos.).

NOTE: Rationing rules require that every car owner immediately write his license number and state on all gasoline coupons in his possession.
