PAID \$1,000,000 READJUSTMENTS

'Checks issued last month as readjustment allowances to returned veterans brought the total paid out in North Carolina under this program to over a million dollas. Veterans seeking employment but temporarily without jcbs, have received \$821,036.00; and self-employed veterans whose net earnings are less than \$100 a. month-most of them farmershave been paid a total of \$272,190.

Applications for these allowances are handled through local Employment Service offices by the Unemployment Compensation Commission of North Caroments come from the United State Vererans Administration. The readjustment allowance program, in effect since September 1944, is carried out under title V of the G. I. Bill of Rights. The maximum allowance for veterans while they are looking for work is \$20 per week. Maximum duration is 52 weeks, depending upon length of military service. At present, weekly payments approximate \$41,713 with 1.935 veteranas drawing the al-

lowances. Fewer veterans engaged in business for themselves have applied this month for the allowances to make up the difference between their net earnings and \$100 during September. Checks amounting to \$17,474 were paid to 178 self employed veterans on the basis of their reports for August. In previous months, more than twice as many veteran's in self employment were receiving payments totalling over \$40,000.
