"A POOR RELATION"

Sol Smith Russell's Amusing Play to be Seen Here

HOF'S DISEASE ABATING

300 Animals Died in Hyde County Alone

Commissioner S. L. Patterson, Dr. B. W. Kilgore, Prof. W. F. Massey and others went today to Tarboro, where they will conduct a farmers' institute.

Mr. Patterson and Dr. Tait Butler, the State Veterinarian, have just returned from Hyde and other eastern counties, where they have been to do what they could to check the epidemic that has caused the death of so many horses.

Mr. Patterson estimates that at least three hundred horses have died from the disease in Hyde county, and a proportionate number in the sections of Pamlico, Beaufort and other counties where the disease prevailed. Dr. Butler says the disease was toxic poisoning, due to eating moldy and rotten food and drinking impure water. In some cases where the horses were given good food they were allowed to drink surface water, which came from places where there was a large amount of decayed vegetable matter, and this caused them to contract the disease. He says the disease is abating and will soon be over.

Mr. Patterson reports that crops in the tide-water section of the State are poor. The cotton has plenty of weed, but it is not fruiting well, and the corn crop is short.

Carlisle's Illness

Mr. Calderon Carlisle, the well-known Washington attorney, has been very ill in Asheville. He was operated on for appendicitis at the Mission hospital, and at last accounts was doing as well as the doctors expected. His friend, Dr. William Mecklenburg Peck, of New York, dean of the medical faculty of Cornell, is in consultation with the local physicians who have the case in charge.

Charged With Perjury

Andrew Robinson and Jesse Ward of Saratoga township, Wilson county, are in jail at Wilson charged with perjury. They were accessory to a burglary committed by Robert Bynum. They swore they knew nothing about the crime. Bynum confessed, and implicated both of them.

AT WORK ON PENSIONS.

The Pension Board is still at work on the applications for pensions. A number of the applications have been rejected, but there will still be a large increase in the list. The revised list will be completed by the end of this week.

INTERSTATE TELEPHONE CO.

Mr. Charles P. Platt, of Chicago, the representative of the Kellogg Switchboard and Supply Company, is in the city arranging for the entire new equipment of the Interstate Telephone Company.

The company has determined to give Raleigh what it claims is the best system in the country, and is going to spend \$30,000 to do this, and have the new system in working order by December.

A new switchboard and an entirely new double wire system is to be put in, the system being remodeled throughout. When the change is completed a subscriber who desires a connection simply removes the receiver from the hook. This lights an incandescent lamp at the switchboard, and the connection desired is quickly made. When this is made it is supervised by a miniature incandescent lamp which permits any subscriber to obtain a new connection in ten seconds after the first is withdrawn.

This system is in use in many of the great cities of the North and West. Baltimore is the only city south using it, and when the 1,200 connection switchboard, with its handsome fittings is put in the Interstate rooms, the officials declare that there will be nothing better in the world than their Raleigh exchange.
