WEATHER CONDITIONS.

Very moderate temepratures con inue to prevail throughout almos he entire country east of the Rock mountains, except at a few southern points. The only stations in the south reporting maximum temperatures of 90 degrees, or above, were: Jackson ville 92 degrees, Taylor and Abilene Texas, 92 degrees, and Augusta an Mobile 90 degrees. On the other han high temperatures continue in the extreme west, Miodena and Winnemucca 94 degrees, Salt Lake City 96 degrees and Phoenix 104 degrees. Scattered rains occurred in the central Mississippi and Missouri valleys, Throughout most of the Cotton Belt and the eastern section of the country generally fair and moderately coe ewather prevails. The lowest temper ature reported during the past 24 hours was 42 degrees at Yellowstone Park, Wyoming.
